

Drug-Free Schools and Campuses Annual Notification to Students

Jackson College student drug and alcohol use policies are provided in compliance with the Drug-Free Schools and Campuses Act.

Community standards

- Unlawful possession, use, or distribution of illicit drugs and alcohol by students is forbidden.
- Campus View student housing is an alcohol-free living and learning environment. Alcohol is prohibited, regardless of a resident's age.
- Despite the provisions of the Michigan Medical Marihuana Act, such use still constitutes a violation of federal law. Jackson College prohibits any use and growth of marijuana on its campuses to comply with federal law.

Violations

Students violating this policy will face the student judicial process. Consequences may include, but are not limited to:

- disciplinary probation,
- required attendance at educational programs,
- referral for assessment and treatment,
- relocation to a new living environment,
- suspension or dismissal from campus housing and/or from Jackson College.

In addition, students can expect to be arrested and fined for violations of federal, state or local laws that occur on campus.

Seek help

- The College's Health Care Clinic, in partnership with Henry Ford Allegiance Health Systems, has a nurse practitioner on Central Campus who can provide substance abuse assessment, counseling and treatment referrals.
- The Campus has contracted with an outside mental health agency, Family Services and Children's Aid, to staff the College's Oasis Center, located in Whiting Hall, near the Health Clinic. Mental health clinicians can provide assessment, counseling and referrals.
- Many medical insurance plans include substance abuse treatment; contact your insurance provider for details.

Several student clubs and organizations, as well as Student Life and Residence Life, offer informational alcohol and drug awareness programs that are free for students.
