		marriage customs in the U.S. and in their own countries. Students may use
		the Internet for additional information.
11		Religion and Beliefs – Students will learn about and discuss the religious and
		other beliefs in the U.S and in their own countries.
12	Chapter 7	Sports and Entertainment – Students will learn about sports and
		entertainment in the U.S. and introduce the class to the popular forms of
		entertainment in their own countries.
13		Classroom Culture – Students will learn about the expectations of the U.S.
		classroom and will compare/contrast with their own countries (examples
		may include: asking questions, giving opinions, etc.)
